



Reverend Dr. J. Donald Ballard, Pastor Emeritus of United Metropolitan Missionary Baptist Church and presently Interim Pastor of New Breed Baptist Church in Cary, North Carolina, will be the guest speaker for the 62nd Men's Day Observance at New Bethel Baptist Church. The observance will be held on Sunday, April 19, 2009 at 11:00 a.m.

Reverend Dr. Ballard is a native of High Point, North Carolina where he completed the requirements for elementary and secondary education. After completing his formal education, he served four years active duty in the United States Air Force in the continental United States and abroad.

Our speaker earned the Bachelor of Arts Degree from Shaw University in Raleigh, North Carolina where he was Salutatorian of his class. He received the Master of Divinity Degree from Duke University Divinity School in Durham, North Carolina. He holds the distinction of being one of the first two black students to attend Duke University Divinity School and was among the top ten members in his class. Shaw University honored him with the Doctor of Divinity Degree.

He began preaching the Gospel while stationed at Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi, Mississippi. He was ordained by the Rowan Baptist Association and at the age of 24, served as pastor of First Institutional Baptist Church in Winston-Salem for six years before (Continued Page 2, Column 1, Article 2)

Rev. Diane Horton Makes Pilgrimage To NYC To Study Urban Ministry

Rev. Horton, along with twenty-one fellow pilgrims, spent Spring Break immersing herself in the streets of New York. The group was comprised of students from Wake Forest University Divinity School, Union Theological Seminary, and University Institute Isedet in Buenos Aires. The group was led by The Rev. Dr. Doug Bailey, President of The Center for Urban Ministry, Inc. Dr. Bailey also serves as Assistant Professor of Urban Ministry at Wake Forest University Divinity School.

Rev. Horton had the opportunity to learn about many different ministries that served the people of the city. She explains her time in NYC as an emotional roller coaster ride. She spent one day in total disbelief after visiting the John Heuss House. This establishment is a small, cramped, underground space where a community of homeless people that suffer mental illness reside. This space is located beneath the financial district near Wall Street!

When she visited the Exodus Transitional Community in Harlem she was inspired by the personal stories of triumph that were shared by young people that had been recently released from prison. These young people had previously been involved with gangs and drugs. Due to the outreach efforts of the Exodus Transitional Community these young people are now making positive changes in their lives.

Throughout the week Rev. Horton worshipped in several different church settings. She will never forget the way her spirit soared at Middle Collegiate church as she listened to a racially and culturally diverse choir sing *Just That Kind Of God.* Nor will she forget the sense of calm and peace she experienced as she listened to Archbishop Desmond Tutu speak at the historical Riverside Church.

One of the highlights for Rev. Horton was the opportunity to visit with The Rev. Dr. Brad Braxton, Pastor of Riverside Church (pictured). Dr. Braxton spoke to the issue of racism in the city and in churches. He offered the group keen insight into what is required of a minister regardless of location.

Rev. Horton feels truly blessed to have been able to make the pilgrimage. Her life has been greatly enriched by the many different faces and voices she encountered in one week in NYC.
