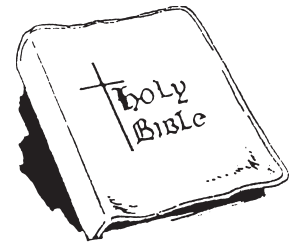

ADDRESSED BLACK HISTORY AUDIENCE

The Black History Committee Presents Dr. Jerry Drayton, A Walking History Book

Dr. Jerry Drayton was chosen by Mrs. Peggy McCullough and Mrs. Kathryn Speas to share his insights into the Black History of Winston-Salem in the 1940s when he came to town.

Speaking from the theme “Education is the key to unlock the golden door to Freedom,” Dr. Drayton credits Morehouse College with preparing him for the upcoming challenges for civil rights using a non-confrontational style to work with all people. Step one is to identify the power brokers for a group, learn them, and solicit their help to solve problems. When Dr. Drayton came to Winston-Salem in 1940s, although he was young, he was one of the few college educated Ministers and he would write letters to the newspapers outlining the problems in a tactful way to let the community know what the Blacks needed or wanted in Winston-Salem. His negotiation skills proved successful not only in Winston-Salem but in the state as the first African American to lead North Carolina’s Human Relations Commission for 8 years each time (16 years total) appointed by Governor Jim Hunt.

As Dr. Drayton stated, after legal segregation was dismantled, up come racism and now it is still present but it is presented in a subtle way. Rev. Jerry Drayton stated that Winston-Salem today has progressed not only by Blacks but

with the help of Whites and others who wanted to make Winston-Salem a better place. In 1944 Dr. Rev. Jerry Drayton organized the Political Action Committee of New Bethel Baptist Church as a way to increase progress, such registering people to vote and encouraging members to make an informed decision by using the vote as a voice. Kudos to the Black History Program Committee and Dr. Jones for being a catalyst to encourage New Bethel to embrace black history and our own Dr. Jerry Drayton’s Story of Winston-Salem.

He has served as a ministerial assistant, an Associate Minister and was charged with the spiritual success of youth and young adults. He worked as chaplain on-call at Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center and as advisor and advocate for the oppressed and underserved. He has traveled extensively, including preaching, teaching, and studying God’s word in Malta and Tunisia; and studying and performing opera in Cortona, Italy with the USC Studio Lirico. He conducted revival in South Africa.

He currently serves as Chaplain for the Winston-Salem Police Department and a wrestling coach for North Forsyth High School.

About Daylight Saving Time When Do We Change Our Clocks?

Most of the United States begins Daylight Saving Time at 2:00 a.m. on the second Sunday in March and reverts to standard time on the first Sunday in November. That means that we need to set our clocks ahead on March 13. Let us stay up late next Saturday after midnight and dutifully set the grandfather clock, the mantel clock and the clock on the microwave. Then someone will take care of the alarm clock and people everywhere will set their watches and clocks in their cars. Cable companies will automatically set TV clocks.

Daylight Saving Time gives us an opportunity to enjoy sunny summer evenings by moving our clocks an hour forward in the spring. There has been opposition and confusion since the early adoption of this law which was conceived by Benjamin Franklin to effectively move an hour of morning to the evening. Even today, many regions and countries routinely change their approaches to DST. There have been time-change riots in the Middle East, fewer criminal acts, changing dates for trick or treating, new born twins might have different birthdays, increase in voter turnout, change in signals at radio and TV stations; all because of Daylight Saving Time.

Let's get ready and get our acts together. Ready or not, Daylight Saving Time begins next Sunday. So let's set our clocks forward one hour so that we will not be one of those straggling late to church, for work, and for appointments. If you're on the 8:00 a.m. shift and you get there by 8:00 but forgot to set your clock forward, you're late. And by the way, as a safety precaution, change the batteries in your smoke detectors.

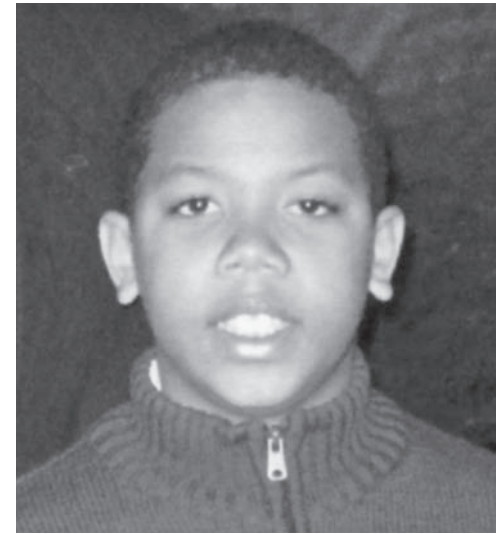
Youth Inducted In Achiever Program

Leaders Must "Pass The Scroll"

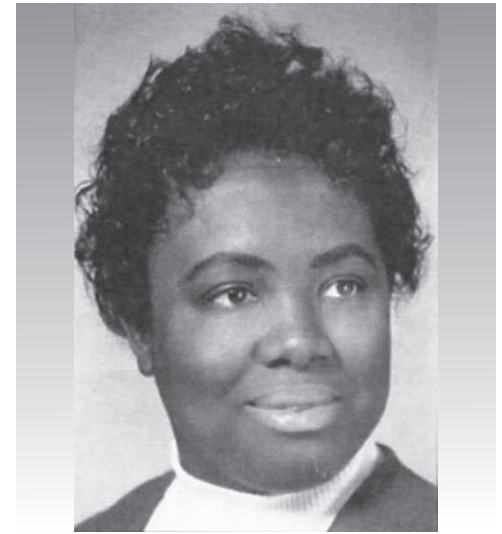
Rev. Dr. Bill J. Leonard, Professor of Church History at Wake Forest University, addressed the 37th Leadership Observance of New Bethel Baptist Church on Sunday, February 20, 2011. Deacon John Posey was worship leader. Trustee Daniel Piggott was Chairperson of the Leadership Observance Committee.

Rev. Leonard holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Texas Wesleyan College, a Master of Divinity Degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, a Doctor of Philosophy Degree from Boston University and a Doctor of Divinity Degree from Franklin College.

He came to Wake Forest in 1996 with a joint appointment in the School of Divinity and the Department of Religion. He is an accomplished author, a captivating lecturer and a seasoned pastor.

Dr. Leonard encouraged the leaders to "Pass The Scroll" and used as a text, Luke 4:16-22. Others on the program were: Mrs. Cynthia Curtis, scripture; Trustee Eugene Thompson, prayer; Deacon Posey, Statement of the Occasion; Mrs. Lennetta Bartley, announcements/welcoming visitors; Trustee Eva McWillis, offertory prayer; and Deacon Charles Hunt, introduction of speaker.

Dr. Leonard began with a quiet demeanor stating, "Ms. Winnie Bradford gave me the scroll (Bible) in my hand at age 5 in First Baptist Church in Decatur, Texas. At age 8, I was promoted to Mr. Johnny Ramey's all boys class. Mr. Ramey gave me a description of Hell so vivid that I accepted Christ as my Savior a few months later." He explained that someone taught Jesus to read Hebrew and the songs. Then Leonard posed the questions—"Who taught you how to read the scroll? Do you remember their names?" He admonished everyone to consider three points before you can lead. They were: 1) Who are you spiritually? 2) Who are you with communally?; and 3) Do you know where you need to go?" He added, "The tradition of Sunday School is getting lost in today's churches." Hence, "people don't know the Bible lessons as they did. Leaders are persons who understand the traditions that are unique to your congregations. "What kind of traditions as leaders will you try to perpetuate," posed Leonard. In closing, we were asked to ponder yet another question, "When the youth of today are our age, who will come bubbling up out of their mouths as the person or persons who passed them the scroll?" He admitted that Ms. Winnie Bradford will forever be remembered as the one who passed me the scroll!
